Easter in the Old Testament

The Old Testament book of Exodus begins with the harrowing account of the people of Israel's escape and rescue from the bondage of slavery. The central event within this story was the Passover, where God intervened to bring about freedom and the subsequent Exodus. The Passover affirmed the faithfulness and certainty of the Triune God of scriptures. Following the first Passover the people of God were called to remember this event on an annual basis. "This day shall be for you a memorial day, and you shall keep it as a feast to the Lord; throughout your generations, as a statute forever, you shall keep it as a feast" (Exodus 12:17, ESV).

In the New Testament it is not a coincidence that the death of Jesus on the cross took place in conjunction with the Passover celebration and that the establishment of the Lord's Supper was also part of this remembrance. The correlation for the early church was clear as Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 5:7-8 "Cleanse out the old leaven that you may be a new lump, as you really are unleavened. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed. Let us therefore celebrate the festival, not with the old leaven, the leaven of malice and evil, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth". Peter also wrote in I Peter 1:17-18 "you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your forefathers, not with perishable things such as silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot".

Presently as we celebrate Communion and Easter we continue to in part celebrate the Passover, the statute that God commissioned for his people to celebrate forever. In Christ we also celebrate and acknowledge the way in which the Old Testament Passover was a foreshadowing of the work of Jesus in the New Testament. The Old Testament Passover accomplished momentary freedom from slavery for a particular people group. The New Testament Passover accomplished in Christ, is an event that is available to all people. The New Testament Passover in Christ makes obtainable forgiveness and freedom from the bondage and slavery that humanity experiences to sin and death. Christ's perfect work as the Passover Lamb provides the capacity to find real and lasting relationship with God. The good news of Christ's Passover should serve as the impetus to live each day not hoping that our self-righteousness can earn us God's favor, but that in his faithfulness and goodness he has made a way available for us. This good news then should compel us to be people who live each day seeking to radiate the grace, forgiveness, life and truth of Christ who is our Passover Lamb!

The re-routing effort significantly lessens the amount of water entering the sewer from the church property. Water entering the brook is emptied into the ocean whereas water entering the sewer system runs through the water treatment plant. Jack Munroe and his diving skills were critical for the exploration and execution of this endeavor.

Boston Rescue Mission Visit

On Monday, Feb. 28th five members of First Baptist drove into Boston to serve a meal at the Boston Rescue Mission on Kingston St. Located in the downtown section of Boston, the BRM has been helping the desperate and homeless since 1899. We are signed up to serve the 3 P.M. meal with them on the fourth Monday of each month.

John Samaan and his wife, Lynn, (who, by the way, live in Rockport), have run the Mission for many years. The Mission is biblically-based, has 30-40 residents, accommodates many men nightly with a mat to sleep on, and serves hundreds of men and women daily. The mission serves <u>seven</u> meals a day.

Our Pastor Matt Wigton, Arvilla Wass, Jim Sherburne, Marjorie Dyksinski and I arrived about 1:45 and were immediately put to work cutting approximately sixty pounds of potatoes into "home fries" pieces to be used the next day at breakfast.

None of us knew what to expect our first time there, and I couldn't help but wonder what condition those we'd be serving would be in: active alcoholics or drug users, would they be fouledmouthed, angry, ungrateful? Matt offered up a prayer before the doors opened for the meal and what a surprise awaited us.....

Kitchen coordinator, Junior, lined us up about 2:50 to give us our instructions. All meals are served cafeteria style. Besides us volunteering there were four others in the kitchen, all residents at the Mission who live on the premises. Resident have to work doing chores at the Mission, attend Bible studies, go to church services at the Mission and attend AA meetings, if applicable, while living there.



Arvilla was the first in the assembly line dishing up potatoes, then she handed the cafeteria tray to me to ladle out chili, then Marjorie added vegetables, Jim salad and Matt fruit cocktail.

At 3 pm the people began to file in to be served. The number of people eating is monitored so there isn't overcrowding. Each person has ten minutes to eat in order to let the next wave come through.

The men (and women) were polite, kind, moderately dressed and when I asked one gentleman, "How ya doing?", he replied, "I'm blessed." Wow, did that put asmile on my face!!! They said "thank you for serving us", truly grateful for the meal.

As each person came forward to receive their meal, I couldn't help say to myself, "each of these people have a story to tell, each one is facing life full-force". I just wanted to talk with each one, pray with each one...but, of course, couldn't. But we had a short break and we were able to talk with a couple of the residents helping in the kitchen. The dishwasher, Carlos, and I had a chance to chat and pray; Arvilla sat with a young lady and also connected prayerfully. What a blessing!!!!!

The menu changed a little and we then had the privilege to serve the "residents" at 4:30... THEN it was our turn to be "served". The kitchen staff got in the cafeteria line and gave us our supper. Then it was 5 pm and time for us to leave, but did we want to????

We wanted to stay and help clean up the tables and put away the chair, but the resident volunteers said, "that's our job and you're free to go". It was difficult for me to say "good-bye" to those helping in the kitchen having connected and knowing just a tiny bit about their story....

.As I mentioned First Baptist Rockport is signed up the last Monday of every month to serve the 3 pm meal, so don't miss the opportunity to "serve" the Lord by serving the homeless in this way....
