The Disciplines

The bitter weather of January always reminds me of my days playing middle school basketball. My school had limited gym space, which relegated the youngest athletes to 6:00 am practices. For a middle school student, practicing before the break of dawn was a challenge, but practicing so early and tackling the bitter weather of mid-winter at the same time seemed to be unbearable. In retrospect, I today recall this time as a great lesson in the importance of discipline. The discipline required to attend these practices was necessary for the growth and cohesion of my basketball team. More importantly, I now recall this experience as teaching the value and necessity of discipline. There are many other examples from within our lives of areas where discipline was and is critical for achieving growth.

There are a number of disciplines that are featured in scripture and throughout the history of the church. These practices do not in themselves bring us closer to God, but they can help us be ready to hear his voice, to discern his will and to obey his commands. In Christ's life, for example, the gospels record a number of times when Jesus went off by himself to pray, to mediate upon God's word and to be alone. Jesus practiced the disciplines of fasting, prayer, worship, meditation upon scripture, and solitude. These are examples of a few of the disciplines which Jesus demonstrated and passed on to us as helpful tools in the journey of Christian discipleship.

Our society places immense value on disciplines that promote physical fitness, emotional wellness, academic advancement, economic stability and relational tranquility. While these objectives have value, if they are the only practices and pursuits that consume our time we are missing out on the daily vibrancy available in Christ. The Apostle Paul reminded his student Timothy "while bodily training is of some value, godliness is of value in every way, as it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come (I Timothy 4:8 ESV)".

As we launch forward in 2011, it is a natural time to reflect upon our discipline or lack of discipline. Do we in our time, values and

priorities indeed desire to grow as imitators of God (Ephesians 5:1) and truly live as Christ's disciples?

If we take seriously the invitation to know God through Christ and to be his disciples in the present we should grow in this call throughout our individual and corporate prioritizing of practices of spiritual discipline. One way to do to this is through participating in the Tuesday night Discipleship Group which has been going through Richard Foster's classic work *Celebration of Discipline*.

Ron Aines

On Wednesday, January 12, Ron Aines went to be with the Lord. Our prayers go to his wife of fifty years Louise, daughter Marsha, and son Marshall and their extended family. Louise remains at their winter home in Northbrook, Illinois, where a service was held celebrating Ron's life on January 18. A memorial service will also be held this summer at First Baptist, Rockport. Ron and Louise have been 'summer members' in Rockport for many years and Louise grew up on School Street in Rockport.

Ron was born in Rhode Island and grew up on a Vermont dairy farm. Valedictorian of his high school class, Ron earned his B.S. from UVM, was honorably discharged from the Air Force, earned his M.S. in agricultural economics from the University of Massachusetts, then pursued his doctorate at Harvard.

He taught at Rutgers University, and moved on to work for the USDA in D.C., moving his family to Virginia. He accepted a corporate role with IMC, a global fertilizer company in Illinois, then became VP with International Harvester and after retiring, became a consultant, traveling with his family to many exotic places including Russia, Africa, Egypt, Europe and Australia. He circumnavigated the world twice.

Ron met Louise after hearing her sing at the Middlebury (VT) Baptist Church. They taught their children and grandkids that salvation comes from a personal belief in Jesus Christ, by the grace of God. A survivor of pancreatic and prostate cancer, Ron's faith sustained him through much adversity.

2010 Church Annual Report In Brief

The Life of the Church....

Is embodied in the church's new motto: FOLLOW JESUS AND PROCLAIM HIM TO THE WORLD.

Pastor Matt Wigton described in his report how this was done month by month during the year within the church family, by participating and showing a more active presence in the Rockport community, and by learning from and supporting missions in the larger world. Focal points came in a variety of ways:

- In response to the tragic earthquake in Haiti in January, a continuing challenge;
- By celebrating the church's 202nd anniversary with an eerily relevant sermon originally delivered by Pastor Ernest E. Ventres eighty years ago;
- By taking dozens of opportunities to learn and be in fellowship in small groups and large including potluck parties, community hymn sings, youth groups, excursions to hear speakers and assist in regional mission work and celebrate birthdays;
- At the vacation bible school, which was preceded by a 50-person 'float' in the 4th of July parade, and the VBS week featuring the theme "Cosmic City";
- Through at least five Sunday schools and study groups held at various times each week;
- During Pastor Matt's preparation and examination for ordination (where the mock ordination council within the membership was more rigorous than the real thing):
- In choral and instrumental events both during services and held at the church for the community;
- At a moving Thanksgiving service where congregants spoke out loud the many ways in which they were blessed during the year;



- In a new Weekly E-Mail sent by Pastor Matt to keep the church community current with events, celebrations and needs;
- And in regular worship and the many activities that take place at the church and among its members and friends.

The Business of the Church....

Takes place in the physical form of maintenance and upgrade of church properties and in the stewardship of financial support that underpins church activities.

Work continues every week in regular maintenance of the church building and the parsonage. Special projects currently underway are cleanup of the basement, replacement of the parsonage deck and exterior trim, improvement of the narthex with new lighting, and re-

placement of tables, smoke detectors, and a ladder. The folding screen next to the piano at the front of the church was rebuilt into shutters attached to the windows. The large, cast iron gas stove in the kitchen was removed and plans are in process for upgrading the kitchen.

First Baptist is blessed to have an endowment, now close to \$700,000 since the growth of financial assets during the year. However the expenses of operating the church and it's ministry continued to exceed the annual giving of members and friends by about \$35,000. Of that amount almost \$20,000 came from income (interest and dividends) generated by the church's investments and the balance came from growth in the principal of the portfolio.

Full and detailed reports (14 pages) by the treasurer, benevolence treasurer, collector and investment management firm are in the printed Annual Report.

The Leadership of the Church....

Gained three new members as others retired from service. Marjorie Dyksinski was tapped to join the Board of Deacons and Chris Dyksinski and Frank Levesque have been nominated to serve on the Board of Stewards. Jim Koerth begins a new three-year term on the Board of Deacons. The Board of Deacons has five members, Stewards have four members and all of the officer categories are filled with the incumbents except for auditor, historian and church school superintendent.

The Body of the Church...

Is the congregation – members and friends – who gather to worship, work, play and support each other and the overall mission of spreading the Word. Our membership number increased by three at the annual meeting and our attendance and participation has grown, particularly in special events. During the spring, summer and fall we average about 70-75 at Sunday worship and even during the cold and snowy winter when many have flown south, or are housebound, 50-60 have been attending. Nominally, First Baptist had 82 members on January 1, 2011.

Fourteen individuals participated in the fall four-session *Exploring Christianity* class and 25 middle and high school students participated in youth group events during the year. Several times during 2010 the sanctuary was filled for holiday services, Christian concerts and special celebrations. Under Ruth Bowers' leadership, more than twenty-five members and friends sang, rang and provided special music for worship and events. Over eighty children and adults participated in Vacation Bible School in July.

Clearly, the body of members and friends is active, growing and everyone has a place to be and do the work of the church.


