# Post Ordination Analysis

Throughout the recent ordination process, I had the opportunity to spend time reflecting about the role of Christian theology within ministry and life. During the last month I was able to engage in dialogue about these reflections with the church community during the mock ordination and Ordination Council. All through the period of dialogue and reflection, I was continually reminded of the value and practical nature of theology. Theology is the study of God. Our thoughts or lack of thoughts about God have a tremendous impact upon who we are and how we live.

Within this time of consideration, I was reminded again of the crucial importance of the role of the Trinity within Christian theology. The notion that God is, was and will be within three forms Father,

that he has revealed himself to humanity and can be known. The infinite God has revealed himself in Christ who reflects back to the Father. Today the Holy Spirit works to bring people to Christ, who continues to glorify God. Furthermore, the Triune God works by inviting people to know him, to pray to him, to live for him, to follow his life-bringing ways, to receive his forgiveness and to be equipped by him. The Triune God's revelation of himself to humanity is a compelling example of his love and grace for the world.

During the Ordination Council, a delegate asked why I used the term "Triune God" so often in the ordination paper. The reason is that it is a term that helpfully describes the most important claim

made by the scriptures and Jesus. God is more than a distant force or amorphous spirit. God is more than a summary of our collective wishes. God is three in one. Theology and Christian practice can become deficient when there is an overemphasis or neglecting of any part of the Trinity. The concept of the Trinity reminds us that God has a purpose and he is today working out his purpose in the cosmos. It is likewise through the Trinity that we have a purpose, responsibility and call. The Trinity both displays the mystery and yet very real reality of God. The wonder of the Triune God should compel us to worship, devotion, discipleship, and service and to a more profound understanding of our collective call to be theologians.

## A River Runs Through It...

The basement, that is. The First Baptist sanctuary sits right on top of a stream that enters and exits through culverts, and flows under town streets into the harbor. Over the years the stream deposited yards of black mud that accumulated along with discarded junk from the church. One of our members has taken on the task of cleaning up the Stygian mess.

He (who prefers to be unnamed) has uncovered both trash and treasures – though none of terrific value. Gone are all the inflammable substances, for which he initially began the project. Gone, too, are many plastic bucket-loads of greasy, black smelly muck, and loads of debris. What's left is an old coal furnace, large heating pipes, old beams and masses of black cobwebs. And every time it rains, the stream brings in more muck, with water sometimes rising as high as four feet deep following a series of heavy downpours.

Among the treasures are 80-plus feet of copper pipe which will be 'sold to the highest bidder', the existing heating system with burners situated well above the high-water mark, and the 'engravings' of church leaders and members of the past. One set of beams bears the carved initials "RWS" and "JPS-KAT". The first is for Robert William Sherburne and the second links John Pitts Sherburne with Katherine Anne Tuck, who married. John Sherburne died before age thirty, leaving Katherine a widow for life. Katherine was a great-aunt to the current generation of Tucks in the congregation and the two Sherburnes were the father and uncle of Jim Sherburne.

It's unlikely that we'll be using our own river for baptisms in the foreseeable future, but we can thank our unnamed friend for doing something important, if unseen, to make our church safer and cleaner downstream.

# **Changing Lives**

"Hey you! Hey you!" children would yell at us as we drove through the streets of Blanchard, a village right outside Port Au Prince in Haiti.

On June 3<sup>rd</sup>, a group of 19 people, 16 college students and 3 adults, headed to



Haiti for 10 days. I had the opportunity to go with this team. The trip was organized through Gordon College and we worked alongside Partners in Development, an organization First Baptist Church of Rockport supports.

Partners in Development is run by Gale Hull. Gale and her husband founded PID 20 years ago in Haiti. The program began by sponsoring ten children in Hai-

ti so they could attend school and started to grow. PID now provides small business loans, housing, and child sponsorship in both Haiti and Guatemala. We were able to see the work being done in Haiti.



A couple of months before our team arrived, Gale and another worker found a building outside of Port Au Prince to be used as the clinic. This is where we stayed the 10 days. We started out sleeping in tents but halfway through the week moved into the guesthouse, once it was completed. Our workday began around 8am. We were woken up every morning by the rooster. We covered ourselves in sunscreen and bug spray. The bugs were only bad in the morning and the evening. It was too hot for them to be out during the day. It

was almost too hot for us to be out during the day. In the daytime the heat index might be 107 or higher, and at night it would be in the high 80's or low 90's.

We were split up each morning into four different groups. Group #1 helped finish the guest-house by laying cement for the floor and building support walls. Group #2 made cement blocks to be used for the walls of the houses being built. Group #3 worked on building a house for a family of six. They tore up an old foundation and started digging the trenches for a new foundation. A month after we left, the house was completed and presented to the family. The final group worked on building walls in a house. We ended the workday around 4. There was always a long line for the showers, which weren't actually showers but rather buckets with water that we poured on ourselves. This helped cool us down but only for a minute. Once we walked outside we would start sweating again. The evenings were filled with playing soccer with Haitians, journaling, devotions, and card games. Our team's favorite card game was Uno.

I am so thankful I had this opportunity to be part of helping so many people. I would love to go back if given the chance but I will make sure it is during the winter when it's not so hot. Thank you for your prayers and support. If you would like to hear more, just ask, I have a lot more to share.

Shannon is 20 years old and originally from New Hampshire. She is a junior at Gordon College, double majoring in Early Childhood Education and Psychology. She started attending First Baptist in the fall of 2009.
