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Annual Report of the Pastor 2021



Matthew, Megan, Ainsley, Alistair and Addison Wigton Resurrection Sunday 2021

In the beginning of the book of Exodus, Moses and Aaron are called to lead a seemingly improbable mission. God instructs them to rescue the Hebrew people from the bondage of Egyptian slavery. Yahweh works through these men to accomplish the implausible, culminating in the Passover and march to the Promised Land. The miraculous acts that surround the Exodus are meant to testify to the watching world the power and faithfulness of God. The challenges that we have faced over the last two years are not nearly to the degree of those felt by the Hebrew people, but we have seen the power and faithfulness of their God. These Old Testament themes were reflected in the year's sermon series in the book of Mark. Throughout this journey we were regularly reminded of the way that gospel centered glory comes through humility. This is true in the redemptive work of Christ and in the daily life of Christian discipleship. During hardship, our church has grown both in numbers and activities but more importantly in our dependency and hope in the historic gospel of Jesus Christ. Thanks for being part of our life together over the last year!

The advent of the pandemic has served to expedite cultural changes that have been well under way for the last decades. This is true of our local and the larger global church. We have moved from living in an era of Christendom to Post-Christian culture¹. We can no longer take for granted that anyone would want to attend a church or take seriously the claims of the Christian faith. This means that we need to continually be engaging our community with the good news of Christ while seeking to grow our existing congregation as faithful disciples of Jesus. When I first came to New England, I thought that Midwestern Christianity could teach New England. Today, I believe flourishing New England churches will foreshadow the way the rest of American Christianity will go in the coming generations.

Adapting the way we do things, does not mean changing what we preach or teach. On the contrary, our future depends on a renewed focus of "contending for the faith that was one delivered to the saints".² All that we do must be oriented around continuing to share the gospel of Jesus, building disciples of Jesus, and encouraging this mission throughout the world. As we come into 2022 after a really great year together, I am more excited about our local church than I have ever been! I hope and pray that we can build on the momentum of the last year to continue to improve our missional approach to maximize long-term sustainability. For all these reasons, I propose the following four initiatives in the coming year:

Lay Leadership Development

This year marks one of the most significant leadership transitions that we have had in recent history. Andy Brown is retiring from her remarkable run of over forty years as volunteer Treasurer. Additionally, we have had several long-term lay leaders retire and an exciting crop of new talent step-up. We are so thankful for the service of those who have given many years to the work of the church and are excited about the new people filling these roles. I want to encourage every person in leadership to prayerfully consider who they are mentoring to fill their role in the future. We can't

expect to generate future Christ-centered leadership if we are not proactively planning, praying, and preparing for it. This model is based on Christ's own plan of discipleship.³

If you are not serving in church leadership, I encourage you to consider where the Triune God may be wanting you to get involved in the mission of our church. Do not serve out of guilt or obligation but out of a joy to be able to be part the historic mission of Rockport Baptist Church. Please join me in praying that future generations will catch the vision of being joyfully engaged in our mission. It is my hope to in the coming years spend more time empowering our church leaders who will then empower others. This is the time-tested model of effective church operations.

For the first century of our church's history, lay leader Ebenezer Pool did a significant part of the teaching and preaching. The church often could not afford a full-time pastor, and few wanted to come to Sandy Bay's far-flung location (at that time). This continues to be the case in many of churches throughout the world where congregations are primarily led by committed volunteers. As the denominations and seminaries that used to provide the church with critical support wither away, regular internal lay leadership development is critical for future sustainability.

Discipleship Group Expansion

One of the ways of that we can both develop leaders and assure that everyone in the church is connected is through involvement in some form of a small group. It's not possible to expect one individual or committee to keep track of the needs of every member of a growing congregation, but small group meetings are able to better cater for individual discipleship needs and foster genuine Christian community. The following are examples of Small Groups that met within the Church throughout 2021: Prayer Group, Choir, Missional Community, Youth Group, Shining Stars, Emotionally Healthy Spirituality, Praise Band, Exploding Comets, Bible Study and more.

Thank you for those who took part in leading or participating in these important groups throughout the church. If you are not yet involved in one these groups, considering joining one that fits your time and interests. Perhaps you should be leading a group? We are currently discussing the development of other types of groups focused on different phases in life and aspects of Christian teaching. As we go smaller, we can go deeper and have a larger impact. Small groups have the potential to help us extend Sunday morning into the seemingly mundane of the rest of the week.

Reevaluate Church Properties

We are very fortunate to own the church and parsonage buildings/properties. These locations have served as important vehicles of ministry for many generations. In 2024 we will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the construction of Ventres Chapel and Harvey Park. Over the last decade the boards have done a significant amount of work upgrading the buildings and bringing them up to 21st century standards. These upgrades and work are reason for real celebration.

The management of the buildings continues to dominate the time of the boards and staff. Church buildings are regularly a blessing and a curse as there is a danger that their focus can overshadow our ability to do faithful ministry. The age and use of all the buildings need to be considered and re-evaluated in a long-term plan as we think about how to best steward our resources for the greatest good.

Strategic Partnerships

The popular notion that Christianity is in decline is demonstrably false.⁴ Apart from a few well-endowed mausoleums to the past, white Mainline Protestantism is dying. Nevertheless, the spread of the historic faith continues in the global East and South. Regionally, this can be seen in places like Lynn and Salem where there are robust and thriving congregations of Spanish, Haitian, Nigerian worshippers of Christ often filling unconventional spaces. In neighboring Gloucester, one of the largest congregations in the

community worships in Portuguese. These demographic changes are not only relevant to the church but the larger planning of the town and region. It is projected that by 2045 whites will be the minority of the U.S. population.⁵

For the Christian we celebrate the beauty of ethnic diversity and look forward to the reverse of Babel when voices from every tribe and nation worship before the Lamb.⁶ Practically these demographic shifts coupled with our missional commands should compel us to be more engaged

It is for this reason that we are exploring a partnership with Washington Street Baptist Church in Lynn. This church with which we have a historical relationship sits in a location where people from 40 different ethnicities live within one mile radius. While we may be able to help this congregation with some practical needs like cleaning their kitchen or painting a fence, we can and will also learn something from their different cultural perspective. We will gain much through humble engagement with thriving multi-ethnic sister churches. This is an exciting example of one way that we can and

BOOKKEEPER'S REPORT

I began working as the bookkeeper for Rockport Baptist in June of 2021. A decision was made this year by the Boards to transition to a new accounting software that would handle the general operating accounts but also be able to efficiently and accurately track grants and restricted funds.

Andy Brown, and her father before her, have served the church for decades, providing invaluable amounts of time and energy making sure the congregation thrived financially. Andy made the decision to focus on other things and the church decided at that time to transition to a bookkeeper position to assist with the move to the new software. David Pierson was instrumental in finding a software that was robust enough to track the church's funds but not so large that it would overwhelm this small but vibrant congregation. This software, called ACCOUNTS, is a small business based in Canada but with many United States clients. The software was created with the sole purpose of tracking non-profit funds. Gail Zeman provided invaluable knowledge from her career in setting up the new software

Gail, Andy and I worked very closely for many weeks getting the new software set-up. We created a new chart of accounts that is more streamlined with the different activities now happening in the church. David provided key IT support as needed and helped in the purchase of a new computer to perform the new bookkeeping duties.

I work approximately five hours per week and perform the following tasks:

- Input all transactions (deposits and withdrawals) into ACCOUNTS
- Double check all deposits and withdrawals against each church fund and restricted account
- Itemize debit card purchases
- Review payroll reports and input in ACCOUNTS
- Cut checks for both the church and parsonage bills
- Prepare monthly reports for the Board meetings including separate reports for each grant and restricted fund
- Assist in the preparation of the annual budget
- Attend budget meetings and answer questions as needed
- Review all accounts monthly for accuracy

I feel so blessed to have joined the staff of the First Baptist Church of Rockport. Shaina, Katie and Matt are wonderful to work with. I cannot express my gratitude enough for Andy who I'm sure will continue to provide much needed support with her years of experience.

CHURCH CURMUDGEON

Pandemic Pondering

Words are woefully inadequate when attempting to describe the heartache of having our loved ones and dear friends die during the time of mandated social distancing. Their leaving has left gaping holes in our lives. My prayer is that the raw bleeding edges of these holes will be embroidered with the blanket stitch of God's comfort and love.

Our lives have been derailed by this current pandemic and it makes us uncomfortable and nervous. Scriptures exhorts us to not panic. The Triune God does not change. I have an ear-worm from the hymn, Great Is Thy Faithfulness" whose repeated phrase is "Thou changes not, thy compassions, they fail not, great is they faithfulness, Lord unto me." Malachi 3:6 - "For I am the Lord, I do not change. Therefore, you are not consumed." We can claim this promise each day as we face our concerns and our ever changing world.

People's responses to the current life changes have run the gamut from fear, outrage and conspiracy theory to co-operation, trust and inner peace. It is common to see people wearing masks but there is another kind of mask that some people hide behind. This pandemic has caused some to let their invisible mask slip off and it has exposed a lack of civility, understanding and kindness toward those with differing opinions. Some seem to worry more about the hiccup in education and social life rather than steadfastly striving to reinforce the <u>innate resiliency</u> that children possess.

The future is not all doom and gloom and history has shown that we can have HOPE. In my almost 87 years of life, adults and children have dealt with, and survived, a lot of stress producing events. I grew up with weekly neighborhood air raids, blackout shades, light globes painted black and drills where we coupled hoses inside the house while another family member ran to the attic window to toss out imaginary incendiary bombs. We got ready for bed in the dark - any light leaking from our windows could make us a target for bombing. In school we had frequent drills where we ducked under our school desks (WWII), then the assassinations of our leaders (JFK, RFK, MLK Jr), horrendous school shootings and currently ALICE drills. IMO, wearing a confining mask, missing months of "proper" education and not participating in social events seems to pale in light of how change was dealt with in the past. Entitlement is a current first world country issue as protesting in many forms has become the norm. After 9/11, there seemed to be a spirit of caring for each other but that soon dissipated and "My Rights" took over.

My parents lived through trying times but didn't discuss the details of their involvement or reaction to the 1918 Spanish Flu pandemic and the succeeding years of national turmoil. My dad had just been discharged from the Army (WW I) and was his hometown's city doctor during that pandemic. I recently downloaded the city's 1919 Annual Report and learned of some of the ways that they dealt with the pandemic. As needed, they closed the schools, implemented mask

mandates and had strict quarantine rules. They did not have the technology that we use today to continue our connections, albeit with varying results.

Following the 1918 pandemic, there was the cataclysmic Great Depression (1929 - 1939). If that was not enough, change continued for their children as the world once again went to war. (World War II -1939-1945). In the winter of my brother's senior year in High School, he and many of his male classmates were conscripted into the service of WW II. They missed many months of schooling and all of the social events associated with senior year were cancelled. Parents went to the graduation to receive their child's diploma. Despite this major interruption in their lives and education, those young boys, those who survived the war, turned out to be the successful adults now known as "The Greatest Generation."

I share this bit of personal reflection because it reminds me that how I react to events can influence others. I am positive about the future because of how my parents dealt with all that life threw in their path. They lived by the words of Jeremiah. There is hope for the future and we need to remain positive and cooperative while in the midst of this pandemic, societal and climate changes.

During this pandemic, we have been given the precious gift of "Time". Time to figure out why we often feel stressed. Time to ask if everything we plan for ourselves and others is really necessary. Have we overbooked our lives and the lives of our kids? Are extracurricular classes and events always vital to a well rounded life? Why are our Day Planners so full that we have no time to slow down and maybe just look at cloud formations? What is success? We can use this time to stop running and take stock of our lives.

May God continue to guide us in this new year as we deal with our ever changing lives.

May we have inner peace as the world continues to spin.

2021 was a year to experiment with a Missional Community. This group was spawned from the Spiritual Formation Group which met for 2 1/2 years. A Missional Community is a medium size group which seeks to mature believers in the faith by engaging in Jesus's mission to make other disciples, care and support each other and love our neighbors as ourselves. This Missional Community has three regular dynamics. "UP" We seek to grow in our relationship with God. "IN" Care for and support one another in ministry and mission and "OUT", further Jesus's kingdom work. We meet for Bible Study, worship, prayer, fellowship events and mission opportunities. We believe this leads to a balanced Christian life. This has been challenging during the pandemic; we sometimes met in person while other times on Zoom. Mission is more difficult virtually, but we managed to support a needy family, sang Christmas Carols provided support to the staff at the Den Mar nursing facility and conducted a prayer walk around the town asking the question.. "How would Jesus see our town and its needs?"

Currently our MC or Missional Community of 8 + people meets every other week. New participants are welcome to any of our meetings. Despite the challenges of a pandemic, our group journeyed through scriptures focusing on God's gracious love for us and His world. For those who want to go deeper in transformation and leadership development, a small group meets to engage in a deeper study every other week. In the spring we offered a class for the community based on the book by Walter Wangerin, <u>Wounds are Where Light Enters</u> and in the fall a course by New York pastor Perter Scazzero, <u>Emotionally Healthy Spirituality</u>. This class will finish in the Spring.

Steward's Report

The Stewards mid-year report ended with mention of two major projects on the horizon, window replacement for the offices due to rot caused by poor water drainage and the condition of the steeple. The effort to remedy both areas is underway spearheaded by Karen Parker. Our first issue with these projects is the lack of expertise in accurately assessing what is wrong and then developing a plan to remedy it. Once contractors are on-site we also have no clue how to ensure they are properly doing the work. It will be critical to have expert oversight of the project execution. The board has taken several actions to address this.

First, we have contracted with an engineering firm "Structures North" to do an assessment of the steeple and other key parts of the building. We expect to have that report soon. This report will inform the steeple repair company "American Steeple" to formulate a proposal for us on the work needed and cost estimates. This work will inform our grant proposal preparation to the Community Preservation Act Committee.

The window project is being handled by Alan Battistelli. As of this report, Alan has assessed the building, met with the historical committee getting approval for the type of window we can get as a replacement, and met with an Anderson window rep on-site to measure. We are waiting for his estimate. The main concern for this project is what Alan will find once his crew removes the old windows. As the siding is removed we will get the full picture of the water damage. Alan has also agreed to provide project oversight for the steeple work once that project is underway. Realistically we will be preparing a plan and grant proposal in 2022 and if all goes well have an idea by the end of 2022 if we can obtain grant money to work with. The grant will be a very important piece of the project as our base cost estimate is \$150,000. Targeting 2023 for the work to begin.

These two large capital projects for 2022 will be handled separately from the operating budget in the same fashion as we recently handled the bathroom project. Monies will be taken from the investment fund to cover the building window project and preliminary expenses for the steeple project. Our best effort to project 2022 expenditures at this time is perhaps \$60,000.00. As reports and estimates arrive we can fine-tune this figure up or down.

2021 has been a year of transition in our financial systems and the volunteers doing the work. As Matt mentioned in his report that volunteer for decades now has been Andy Brown and she is stepping away from full-time treasurer duties. The stewards brought on Jenna Olson, an experienced non-profit bookkeeper to work with us. Headed by Gail Zeman and Andy Brown, Jenna has transitioned our accounting to a cloud-based piece of software designed for churches. This allows us to rethink the role of the treasurer to not be so demanding of one person. David Pierson will serve as interim treasurer until such time as we have a new financial workflow in place and God raises up a person with the needed gifts and talents to take on the redesigned role of treasurer. The Stewards are pleased to share an approved plan for the repurposing of the "Ladies Parlor" to the "Family Room". A special committee headed by Maureen Small joined by Shaina, Margaret Williams, Nancy Palazola, and Meaghan Shelton has worked to decide what the purpose of the space should be and then how to furnish it. Look for the new furnishing in the first quarter of the new year!

Finally, the board wishes to acknowledge long-time Steward Margaret Williams whose term is ending this year. Margaret has served quietly and faithfully in many aspects of our church for many years. We have all benefited from her wisdom and willingness to roll up her sleeves and get to work!

May God give us wisdom and boldness to expect great things as he takes us into a new year!
