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THE 2022 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PASTOR

“Are we there yet”? It is the perennial anthem of children buckled in for a road trip. It is also the plea of humankind as we feel and absorb the seemingly never-ending cycle of bad news. The Hebrew Narrative enters into this dialogue with a plot twist. The voice of God has replied to our angst and longings. There is a God. One God. Unlike the distant gods of the Ancient Near East and modern-day Rockport, Yahweh is sovereign over time and space and revealed his plan so that we each have the opportunity to personally know and experience his goodness.

Key to understanding the revelation of the Triune God is seeing the way that God is always faithful to his promises. From our point of view these actions do not always come when or how we want them. The Hebrew people had to wait 400 years between God’s covenant with the Patriarch’s and God’s miraculous deliverance from the bondage of Egyptian slavery.

I don’t like to wait. We don’t like to wait. We are a culture that has elevated expediency and the pursuits of comfort, safety and personal pleasure to godlike supremacy. These virtues are



antithetical to the biblical call to embrace a life of suffering. Being a Christian, serving in a church, and being in a family are all daily exercises in suffering. It is only the Gospel, and daily remembering this good news of the victory of the suffering servant that gives us the power to persevere each day. It is the Gospel that puts the daily struggles in perspective of the grand redemptive narrative. True life and glory come through the path of suffering and perseverance.

What does the church have that cannot be found anywhere else? There are plenty of other places to find nice (probably nicer) people, good food and fellowship, engaging music, emotional stimulation, social welfare programs and attempts at finite justice. The one thing the church has is the message of the gospel. There is a God. The one Triune God. He is now known through and in Jesus. There is reason not to run from the sufferings of this world, but to persevere through them rejoicing all the way.

These are the lessons that I have grown to see more fully through teaching and preaching through Genesis and Exodus over the last year. They are also lessons I have experienced through the last 15 years of serving at Rockport Baptist. There have been seasons of challenge, but

through persevering and trusting in God and his word we have been able to see much evidence of God's provision and faithfulness.

2022 was truly a remarkable year at Rockport Baptist Church. The following Annual Report will lay out a fuller picture of the noteworthy aspects of the year. Make no mistake this year is a product of God's grace and mercy but in his grace and mercy he has allowed many people to work hard, to serve diligently in some cases for years or decades to get us to the place that we are today.

As we move forward, we must continue to seek this balance of trusting God while also faithfully seeking to obey him with our daily lives. We must pray but we must also use the minds and skills God has given us to carry out the mission of the church in the context of our day. We should seek to hear God through the study of scripture while learning from the mistakes and successes of other churches today and in the past. We need to train and challenge believers while also engaging and evangelizing our post-Christian culture. These are big tasks, but it really is a deep joy as we get to do them together.

The longer we are on the road the more we get to see God's provision and the beauty of his big picture plan. The Journey is getting started. Buckle-up!

BOOKKEEPER'S REPORT

It's been a year and half since I started as the bookkeeper for Rockport Baptist. The first few months of 2022 were spent still getting to know the software and streamlining the paying of expenses. David Pierson, Treasurer, and I work closely to make sure employees are paid, bills are paid and the boards and members have access to detailed reports.

The last few months of 2022 were spent working on the budget for 2023. This was the first year using the new ACCOUNTS software exclusively and it definitely did its job. The detailed reports of both operating account line items and grants/restricted accounts proved to be invaluable in budget discussions with the Board of Deacons, Board of Stewards and Music Committee. Because this was the first year actually using all of the resources available in the software, there was a lot of time spent by the Boards looking at the structure of the Chart of Accounts. Between David, myself and the Boards, we have rearranged some line items and hopefully have created a budget that is easier to read and understand.



I work approximately five hours per week and perform the following tasks:

- Input all transactions (deposits and withdrawals) into ACCOUNTS
- Double check all deposits, withdrawals against each church fund and restricted account
- Itemize debit card purchases
- Review payroll reports and input in ACCOUNTS
- Cut checks for both the church and parsonage bills
- Prepare monthly reports for the Board meetings - including separate reports for each grant and restricted fund
- Assist in the preparation of the annual budget
- Attend budget meetings and answer questions as needed
- Review all accounts monthly for accuracy

I am blessed to be able to work with Shaina, Katie and Matt and the countless volunteers who support and encourage one another and make it a joy to come into work each week.

MUSIC DIRECTOR'S REPORT

This is the charge we are given and as always, I am very thankful to have many talented musicians willing to share their time and talents to help lead us in worship every Sunday. Leading worship music has always been important to me and I am thankful for the gifts and opportunities He has provided.

The music ministry in our church continues to be very strong. The choir meets weekly on Wednesday evenings at 5:45. The music we sing is either for Sopranos, Altos, Tenors & Basses or for Sopranos, Altos and Baritones. That means that there are different notes written for each of the sections. Once each section has learned their notes the focus becomes combining the notes, vowels, volume, etc. to create a beautiful piece of music. Our Choir was able to resume this Fall and we are all happy to be singing together again. Unfortunately, sicknesses are and always will be going around. We missed singing our second Christmas selection this season but will have it ready for next year.

As an aside, some of you may remember our Bell Choir directed by Ruth Bowers that played 5 Octave music in church and in competitions. While I am hoping to have a Bell Choir in the future it will be on a much smaller scale. I am happy to report we were able to rehome many of the bells, tables and music with the Koerth's in South Carolina. The Bell Choir at their church was very, very happy to receive them.

Thank you, to all our current singers and we are always happy to have new members. Please, let me know if you are interested in joining us.

Thank you for all your support throughout the year. As always, I welcome suggestions for a favorite hymn, carol or any other type of music you would like included in the service. Music is a key part of worship and we will continue to do our best.

*During the Covid-19 Shutdowns of 2020 churches were prohibited from meeting in-person for the longest time in U.S. History from the middle of March until late May. 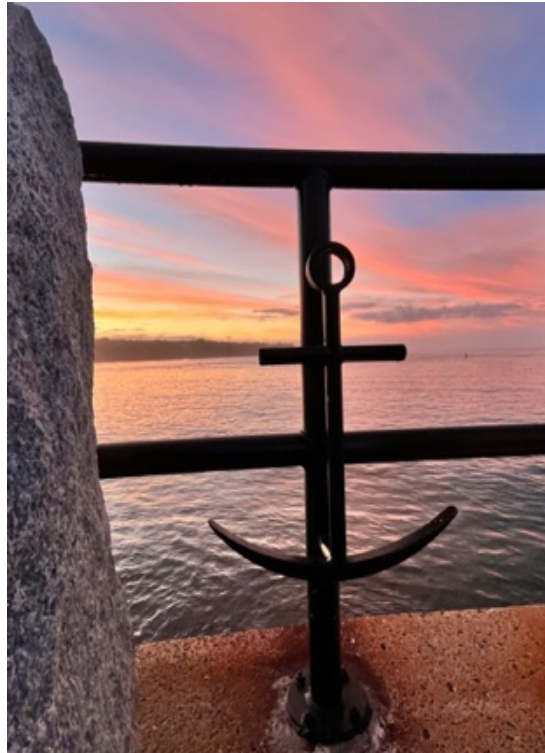

DEACONS' REPORT

Our Goal: Follow Jesus and Proclaim Him to the World!!

Some of you may wonder “what is a Deacon? “What does a Deacon do?”

The definition of Deacon is: Servant; one who serves.

The Greek translation of Deacon is: A. a slave who completely belongs to his master/owner and has no freedom to leave his master. B. a servant who willingly serves his master.

As a board, we are constantly looking to where we can “serve”. As overseers at First Baptist, we want to glorify the Triune God; worship Him in spirit and in truth. We want our worship to be “pleasing” to Him. So, we are always looking for ways we can achieve this in these areas: Music, Sermons, Greeting people, Discipleship, Fellowship, and our ethical and moral conduct as believers in and outside the church.

How do others see us as a church? How do we see and engage with people? Matt has a passion for reaching those living in Rockport and being a witness to them. We host daily AA meetings and weekly Rotary Club meetings and open our doors to other town related meetings and show them the love of Christ. Our passion, as members inside the church, needs to be reaching out those sitting next to us, in front of us, behind us in the pews. I challenge ALL of us to get to know those around us.

We have experienced a period of growth with new families attending and more children attending Sunday School. Along with this growth comes “growing pains” of a blessed kind, but presents challenges for the Deacons to be effectually aware of any issues needing attention. Some of the areas we “oversee” are:

1. Middle School Youth group meet Tuesdays from 3-4 with Matt and Katie Favaloro leading.
2. Children's Church meets during church (Meaghan Shelton, coordinator) and the children “run” when called to their classrooms.
3. Music Committee meets once a month (Anthony Shelton, Chairman) to review how well the Praise Band is doing, how is the organ functioning, the Choir (Laurie Tuck. Director), how is the sound equipment functioning?
4. Fellowship time after church (Julie Oulton, Coordinator) brings many together over food, coffee and good conversation.
5. Missionaries we currently support are: Ryan and Erin Bennett with children Elias and Charlotte serving in Paris, France; Peter and Deborah Johnson serving in Toronto Canada; Haiti Christian school project; Jon and Amanda Good with 4 teenage children serving in Hungary, Amirah, Inc. – helping survivors of sexual exploitation find hope, Hope Ascending with Carl Oulton ministering in No. India & Nepal & Open Door of Cape Ann. As a side note – there are approximately 7 from First Baptist going to France this March traveling to sights in and around Paris, as well as meeting with

the Bennett's and attending functions they sponsor in their neighborhood.

6. Vacation Bible School (Meaghan Shelton, Coordinator) annually meets the 3rd week in July. This ministry takes a "village" to coordinate and carry out... We have amazing volunteers that faithfully meet, greet and minister to over 70 or more children with many children returning to be helpers.
7. Bible Study meets Wednesdays 9:30 – 11 am. Pastor Matt leads over 20 participants each week. Currently they are studying the book of Exodus.
8. Men's group meets on the 1st Saturday of the month at 8:30 (David Pierson, Leading). I don't know what they discuss because I'm a woman and they won't let me attend!!! ha ha
9. Ladies' ministry has been hosting "Ladies Teas" periodically on Wednesdays this year with 20-24 in attendance. (Jenn MacLeod, Danielle Michel & Maureen Small coordinators). Teaching, tea, lunch and good fellowship are devoured by all.
10. Sunday morning Bible study meets at 8:30-9 am (Jonathan Valvano, Leading) Everyone is welcome – just come.
11. Prayer team meets Tuesday evenings from 6:45 – 7:30 (Kris Carlson, Leading) Everyone is welcome to join us – just come
12. Missional Community meets every OTHER Thursday evening at 7 pm either in homes or at the church. (John & Janet French, Leading)

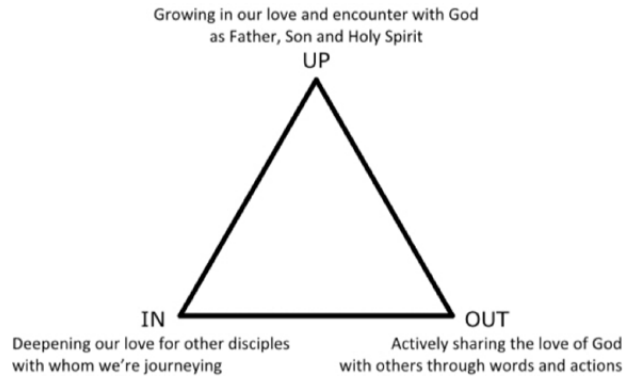

We also want to thank all of you who helped in any way to bless this church and its ministries in 2022 – FOR YOU ARE MANY!!

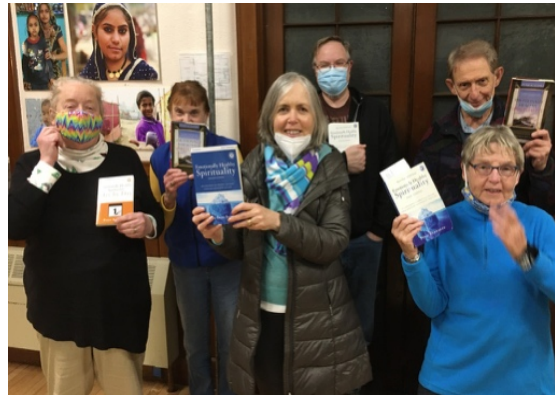
Above all, we need to pray continually that our walk with Jesus would be a positive witness to those at First Baptist, our family, friends, Rockport and beyond.

A Missional Community (MC) is a medium size group which seeks to mature believers in the faith by engaging in Jesus' mission to make other disciples, care and support each other and love our neighbors as ourselves. Our signature verse is Jesus' teaching on the commandments. "Love God with heart, mind, soul and strength and your neighbor as yourself." Our Missional Community has three regular dynamics. "UP" We seek to grow in our relationship with God. "IN" Care for and support one another in ministry and mission and "OUT" further Jesus' kingdom work. About 8-12 people meet every other week on Thursdays. for Bible Study, worship, prayer, fellowship events and mission opportunities. New participants are welcome to our meetings.



This year we focused on local mission. Since AA uses our building regularly and helps those affected by alcoholism, we offered lunch on three occasions to let them know we appreciate their work. We are reading a book called The Art of Neighboring. This book encourages us to get to know neighbors around our homes. We identify neighbors and are challenged to get to know someone we do not know well. Relationship building gives us opportunities to share the gospel. We also provided help to a needy Rockport family and again, sang Christmas Carols at Oceanside nursing facility.

We regularly read the scriptures and actively find ways to put them into practice. In the winter and spring, we offered a course by New York pastor Peter Scazzero, Emotionally Healthy Spirituality.

STEWARD'S REPORT

First and foremost, the Board of Stewards is most grateful for God's abundant provision for every aspect of our work in 2022. This not only includes being so very thankful for the financial means, but also the time, knowledge, and efforts of many skilled craftsmen, board members, church staff, and volunteers.

2022 was definitely a very, very busy year for the Stewards. At the beginning of the year, the Board, with help from American Steeple, Structures North, and contractor Alan Batistelli, put together a proposal to rebuild the Church steeple and replace windows in the office wing of the Church. In February, the final proposal of \$364,000 was submitted to the Rockport Community Preservation Committee (CPC) for CPA funding. In June, the CPC voted to approve \$334,000 for rebuilding the steeple only. The \$334,000 was accepted by vote at Town Meeting on September 4th. Steeple work will most likely start in Spring of 2023.



In September, the Board held a Special Business Meeting where it was voted to move forward with researching and exploring (tax ramifications, legal ramifications, impact on Pastor salary, etc.) the idea of selling the Parsonage building. Once the Board finishes its research, a future special meeting will be planned to present the findings and to vote on whether to sell or not.



Since window replacement funds were not included in the funds granted by the CPC, the Board voted to use capital funds to replace nine windows in the office wing of the Church. We contracted with Alan Batistelli to order the windows and do the work. The new windows came in October and were installed in November.

During the year, the Stewards also worked on a number of repair and maintenance projects within both the Church and the Parsonage.

2022 Church Projects

- Redesigning, redecorating, and renaming the new Family Room.
- Replacement of the Wayside Pulpit with a newly designed Church Sign.
- Adding the electrical for a spotlight to light up the new Church Sign.
- Replacement of the church furnace pump.



- Organization of a church work day where we cleaned the church and removed trash and debris from storage areas and basements.

2022 Parsonage Projects

- Replacement of two Storm Doors.
- Repair of a water main leak in the basement.
- Replacement of all the garage door mechanics for the automatic garage door opener.

In the latter part of the year, the Board spent time tweaking our new financial system and chart of accounts that was implemented in 2021. These changes will help make the budgeting process a lot easier going forward.

Finally, the Board wishes to acknowledge and thank Meaghan Shelton (who is moving to the Board of Deacons in 2023) for her willingness to volunteer and serve on the Board Stewards since 2021.

MUSIC COMMITTEE REPORT

Psalms 150:1-5 states: *“Praise him with the sounding of the trumpet, praise him with the harp and lyre, praise him with timbrel and dancing, praise him with the strings and pipe, praise him with the clash of cymbals, praise him with resounding cymbals.”*

The music committee endeavors to encourage congregants and visitors of the church to participate in the praise and worship of our triune God through music. This includes the planning and implementation of music for Sunday morning worship services and special music events. The committee is comprised of a member each from the Boards of Deacons and Stewards, a Choir member, the Pastor, and the Committee Chairperson. The Music Director is appointed by the committee and is in attendance at committee meetings.

This year, the music committee gladly welcomed Cheryl Petras as a member. A regular monthly meeting schedule was established, and a review of current bylaws occurred in late Spring. Review of equipment/maintenance and budgetary needs were assessed at each meeting, as well as updates from the Choir and Praise Band, and planning for special music events.

The Choir was reinvigorated this year with the startup of weekly rehearsals in September and led in worship with the anthem *“Come Follow Me”* in October with monthly performances planned. New member Patti Arnold was welcomed to the choir in September, joining in harmony with members Betsy Eck, Joan Keepe, John Lafond, Cheryl Petras, Mark Small, and Gail Zeman.

The Praise Band led in Sunday worship weekly and was integrated with Vacation Bible School for the first time this year, providing live music to start and end each day for the children. In coordination with the Prayer Team, a Praise Night in August was hosted. Both guest vocalist (Caleb Wnorowski) and new members were welcomed this year, including Victoria (vocalist) and German Disla (keys), and Vincent Briguglio (bass guitar), alongside members Phil Michel, Julie and Carl Oulton, Shaina Stowell and Laurie Tuck.

Equipment needs were assessed and therefore the sanctuary piano was tuned, the pipe organ was tuned and a maintenance assessment was performed. In addition, an electronic keyboard was purchased, as well as planning and projection software for the sanctuary.

As the committee continues to encourage worship through music, we prayerfully thank God for providing musical talent to our church and being allowed the chance to lead the church’s music planning and implementation.

COLLECTOR'S REPORT

The financial operations of our church have become more efficient this year, now that we have the expert services of bookkeeper Jenna Olson and are maintaining records on software designed specifically for churches and other non-profits. Numerical information in this Annual Report was developed through the software. Even the form of giving has changed recently -- many people in the Rockport Baptist community are choosing to give tithes, pledges, Sunday collections and special offerings electronically. That's good for the church and easier for the givers. A small number of people use PayPal, though it charges the church a fee for each transaction. Others arrange with their banks to automatically mail checks every week, month or year. All gifts and receipts that come to the church, whether to support the work of the church, reimburse the cost of outside activities, or give funds for flowers, go through the collector's system and are deposited into our bank. We have had the 'fullest' giving year in 2022, I believe, in the life of the church. This is the first year in my recollection that gifts have almost met the operating needs of the church, without having to take money from the investment account. Our God has provided!!!

The church leaders stepped out in faith during the COVID pandemic and reopened both Sunday services and Youth Sunday School and other programs earlier than anyone else in the local area, sometimes outside in the snow! The growth in the number of young families was significant and those families led the parade into the church pews as society began to reopen in general. Many older people also came to our doors and stayed. The average number in worship on Sundays has increased notably and that's only part of the total of people who attend other programs, studies and prayer groups that meet at other times.
